I have forwarded your message to the president of the chapter and will read the email at our next board meeting. The main reason for the meeting is to finalize plans for the updating and refurbishing of the restrooms. They have not been updated since our 1959 renovation, so they are in need of work. We did a major renovation in 1991 but ran out of money to finish all the work. We did install a new fire alarm and sprinkler system as well as all new electrical systems, so the safety of the house was addressed (our primary goal).

Again, thank you for your comments. Please come back and visit us again.

Alumni Report By Gary Batesole '77, Housing Corporation President

The Great Bathroom Debate

The votes have been counted and tabulated. With over 250 brothers in the bond responding, some anonymously, and with an 80-percent approval rating, the results are in: "Save the House."

The emotional reply by many of those who wish to see the Phi Lodge remain at 503 State Street was that we have been at the same location for too many years to move and the structure itself is too historic and filled with memories to tear down and rebuild.

The Housing Board has unanimously voted to renovate the bathrooms, fix the gutters, flash and caulk the windows and waterproof and seal the front porch. The bathrooms will be gutted to the studs, all new plumbing and fixtures installed and new walls will go up. To save money, we voted not to change the layout of the bathrooms but simply replace everything where it was with new materials. We had several offers from fellow Phi brothers to donate time to re-engineer and redesign the layout, and we appreciate each offer. However, we decided that the existing layout was adequate and that keeping everything in the same place saved considerable construction costs. Everything in the rooms will be new — from the ceilings to the lights to the plumbing to the fixtures to the walls, tile, the floor and even the doors.







To finally fix the small water leaks we have in the building, new flashing and caulking around the windows will be done. We have found that the windows lacked flashing and were leaking during each hard, wind-driven rain. The front porch, which is also the ceiling in a part of the basement, has been leaking. We have hired a company on the recommendation of Jim Wurster's ('59) firm, American Consulting, Inc., that specializes in waterproofing and sealing. They also waterproofed and sealed the foundation of the original part of the house a few years ago, and we have not had any foundation leaks since then.

In order to pay for these projects, we have obtained a \$200,000 mortgage. While we can afford the mortgage, it does severely cut into any future repairs that the house may need. We hope to pay off the mortgage early by a combination of more actives living in the Phi Lodge and donations from alumni. These are the bare minimum repairs needed in order to be competitive in the student housing market and ensure the long-term survivability of the house.

There are still many repairs needed that are not as urgent and can be delayed, although not indefinitely. We hope you, the alumni of Indiana Theta of Phi Delta Theta, approve of the actions of your Alumni Board and will continue to support your fraternity in the future.



Profile In Memory of Joe Rush '38 An Extraordinary Phi Delt

One of Indiana Theta Chapter's most dedicated alumni, Joseph Henry Rush '38, passed away in Lafayette on April 3, 2003, at the age of 86. While his health had declined the past couple of years, he remained alert and was driving his car until a trip to the hospital prevented that during his last few days.

Joe had been a member of the Indiana Theta Housing Board much of the time since he completed WWII military service, a career that included 30 combat missions as a B24 bomber pilot with the 8th Army Air Force. He was awarded the Air Medal with five clusters for this outstanding accomplishment.

He was born in Roanoke, Va., in 1917. The family moved to Lafayette in 1927 where his father organized the Rush Metal Products Company. Joe graduated from Jefferson High School and continued his education in the School of Mechanical Engineering at Purdue as a member of the Class of 1938. His subsequent business career was with the family-owned company as the vice president. His son, Steve, is now president of the successor company, Cartesian Corporation.



Much credit goes to Joe Rush as one of the cofounders of the oldest Greek chapter house in the

state of Indiana. For years on end, Joe personally supervised getting things done at 503 State Street, particularly during the summer months. He was indeed "Mr. Fixit." He received a special plaque from our Housing Board in recognition of his valuable efforts.

One of Joe's many civic activities was the Lafayette park system, one which he shared with wife, Martha. He served on the park board for 39 years. The Martha and Joseph Rush Pavilion at Columbian Park was named in their honor. He served as a board member of the Lafayette Leadership Council and the Purdue President's Council. Additionally, he was a very active member of the John Purdue Club. With his brother, Jim '42, he greatly assisted Purdue athletic programs for many, many years by providing more jobs for student athletes than any other business organization in the Lafayette area.

Joe's outstanding support for so many important organizations and activities were recognized when the Marquis of Lafayette Award was presented to him by the Lafayette Chamber of Commerce and the Lafayette City Council. He also received the prestigious Sagamore of the Wabash Award by then Indiana governor, Roger Bramigan, who incidentally was a member of Phi Delta Theta at his alma mater, Frankin College.

All Indiana Theta Phi brothers can be very thankful for Joe Rush's outstanding efforts and contributions to our fraternity for so many years.
