WE DID IT!

We've raised \$312,000 to complete much-needed room renovations!

The 2-for-1 fundraising goal has been reached! Not only did we reach it, but we exceeded our goal by \$12,000! We had quite a few donations at the end of the year, including one large donation from an alumnus who we will not name just remember to buy Red Gold tomatoes and use Red Gold ketchup and mustard.

With the \$100,000 matching donations from **Russ**

Wurster (1957) and **Bob Bowen** (1961), we were able to raise a total of \$312,000 to complete our room renovations over the next two years.

We are a little ahead of schedule and have just completed renovating Room #9, which was not scheduled to be completed until the end of the spring semester. So, we are moving onto renovating the Jay Ihlenfeld Suite, formally known as Room #7. We should finish renovating all the rooms on the second floor this summer and will move on to the third-floor room renovations shortly thereafter. Even the West Lafayette building inspector is excited to see our progress! He recently told us that, other than the totally new construction of The Farmhouse, no other fraternal organization is remodeling their house into the suite concept that we have been doing. That gives us a head start on other Fraternities (but if you look at all the construction cranes hovering over the Village area, we are just keeping up with the new apartments that are being built). Even Purdue has gotten into the act, by building



the Honors College Housing that is 100 percent suites.

The Actives have bought all new laundry equipment and we upgraded the exhaust system to accommodate the new machines. We brought all the dryer venting and the washing machine drainage up to code. Fun fact: Tim Quigley (1976) recently found copies of the original blueprints of the 1910 construction of the Phi

Lodge, and they had washing machines (but no dryers) in the basement where the Chapter Room is now.

The recently retired Gary Jackson (1975) has joined the Housing Board and has volunteered to organize and track our growing list of room furnishings that we are purchasing for the renovated rooms. We will buy new, full-size beds and mattresses, as well as a chest of drawers, desk and chair for each bedroom. The other item we will buy is a floor-standing air conditioning unit that looks like an oversized humidifier. It uses a window adapter that blows the hot air outside without having an ugly window air conditioner hanging out the window. We will no longer have air conditioners that drip water onto the outside brick walls and cause mildew damage. In the next few years we would like to air condition all the common areas, such as the living room and dining room.

Your donations make future upgrades to the Phi Lodge much more financially feasible, using the rent money we receive from the Actives for renovations instead of repairs!

JIM LEVERENZ '59 CREATES IMPRESSIVE NEIL ARMSTRONG SCULPTURE



Jim Leverenz '59 has recreated a wooden sculpture depicting Neil Armstrong during the moon landing.

The Judy Gale Roberts Studio in Tennessee was commissioned by NASA to create a much larger version for the Kennedy Space Center to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the first moon walk, showing a reverse angle of the famous picture of Buzz Aldrin saluting the American flag. Since there are no pictures of Neil when he saluted the flag, different artists have created their own versions of the famous moment.

When Jim saw the larger wooden piece of Neil saluting the flag, he decided to create his own version. All the colors of the sculpture, except the paint on the American flag, are created using the natural colors of various species of wood; the piece of artwork required 607 separate pieces of wood.

This is a very difficult and tedious way to create art, but Jim has pulled it off beautifully! He also built a wooden easel stand for the piece.

A few weeks ago, Jim visited the Phi Lodge and donated the sculpture to the Neil A. Armstrong Library, which is very much appreciated. In the past, Jim has also donated various wooden art to the fraternity, such as the Purdue/Phi Delta Theta clocks made from wood from the floor of Keady Court at Mackey Arena. We have presented quite a few of these clocks to alumni who have given talks to the students over the years at our annual Founder's Day Dinners.


